City officials We don't work directly with the City Council but do have working relationships with several of the boards: Fairmount Cemetery board, COSA Historic Preservation Commission.

County officials We brag about our County Judge and Commissioners Court constantly. They are generous with their time and are eager to participate when called upon. We work with the County Clerk's office assisting them with property information, historic owner information, and locations of cemeteries. The County Treasurer is in charge of County Government Week / Month activities and we work with her on events. Many of our elected officials ask the TGCHC for assistance with their State or Regional Conferences... sometimes providing copies of historic photos or even building small exhibits for them to take. The email and phone numbers of our chairman are known to all officials, including the county library's reference department. We answer homework questions, property owner questions, and queries about missing or torn down structures.

Nonprofit organizations (heritage group, visitor bureau, etc.) Tom Green County has an abundance of non-profits - many with historical interests. The TGCHC Chair has frequent meetings and conversations with officers of these groups. We work to coordinate events and enhance the success of programs by including their events on our primary calendar. Many organizations request assistance with sound systems, honor guards, flag stands, and other assets we have. By supporting and attending other organizations, we find they are eager to participate in our events.

Educational institutions (school districts, community colleges, universities) members are active in Angelo State University's West Texas Collection and participate in their seminars; maintain contact with the WTC director for special research needs and often answer questions she presents

Landmark commissions COSA Historic Preservation Commission is the landmark commission.

Museum boards We have a very close relationship with Fort Concho NHL's director, Bob Bluthardt, and the staff and board members. We support their special events, assist in research requests, and align our special events not to conflict with the Fort's activities.

These new Associates drive up to 150 miles to attend our monthly meetings and participate in special events. As a result, they have brought local family members and friends to our meetings. The membership is expanding.

19. Project #1: *(please provide a **brief** description below)*

Oct. 2 - Battle of Gonzales (175th Anniversary of the Texas Revolution) In 1835 - 1836 West Texas was an unknown frontier. Today the battle sites of the Texas War for Independence are a minimum of three hours away. The TGCHC decided we should bring the Texas Revolution to West Texas and Tom Green County. The first battle of the Revolution was fought at Gonzales on Oct. 2, 1835. The famous Gonzales Eighteen were Masons who fought valiantly and raised the 'Come and Take It' flag. We contacted the two Masonic Lodges of San Angelo to invite their participation in a very special ceremony commemorating the event. Receiving the approval of the Grand Lodge of Texas in Waco, local Masons helped prepare the program and officially raised the "Come and Take It" flag during the ceremonies. A Masonic official told the story of the important roles of famous Masons in early Republic of Texas History. Tom Green County Judge Mike Brown, Commissioner Steve Floyd, TGC Veterans Service Director Tim L. Vasquez each spoke on different facets of the Revolution and its significance today. Mrs. Kathy Fritze, descendant of Creed Taylor, a famous soldier of the Revolution who fought at Gonzales and at San Jacinto, told of Taylor's contributions and participation in four battles of the Revolution. Joyce Gray, president of The Daughters of the Republic of Texas - Fort Concho Chapter, also participated. Chairman Golda Foster emceed the proceedings. All our speakers reported histories of famous participants and reasons for the fight for independence. The Tom Green County Historic Honor Guard and the All Veterans Council Color Guard presented the national and state colors. Taps was performed by Gaylan Harrison, the bugler from Sons of Confederate Veterans. A large audience attended the event. Media coverage promoted and covered the event with follow-up for several days. The program resulted in many inquiries about TGCHC future programs, calls from residents who had early Texas soldier citizens, and requests for speakers for programs on Texas history. We consider this, the first of four Texas Revolution programs, to be a major success. The war didn't happen here, but we succeeded in bringing it to life in Tom Green County.

20. Project #2: *(please provide a **brief** description below)*

Oct. 10 - Dedication of THC Historical Marker honoring Immanuel Baptist Church - San Angelo and Centennial program. Marker research and dedications are part of the CHC mandate. A church's centennial is a major event and the Immanuel Baptist Church commemorated their centennial with several days of activities including the marker dedication. Our TGCHC chair worked with the Centennial Committee for several months preparing the program. State Rep. Drew Darby played a major role in the ceremony as did our County Commissioner Steve Floyd. The marker research was completed by 94-year old Mrs. Virginia Fikes. The ceremony drew approximately 300 people and

media coverage. Historical exhibits were developed and a huge dinner followed the program. Members of the TGCHC and County Commissioner Ralph Hoelscher and his wife participated in the program which was emceed by the TGCHC Chair. We invited several people interested in marker applications to attend the ceremony. As a result, the Wall Brethren Church did apply and receive approval for a historical marker of their own.

21. Project #3: *(please provide a **brief** description below)*

Oct. 2 - Dec. 31, 2010 continuing thru April 22, 2011 - Flags of the Revolution. The research conducted in preparing for the Battle of Gonzales program revealed 14 known flags of the Revolution. We purchased each of these flags. In cooperation with the TGC Veterans Service Director Tim L. Vasquez, the TGCHC is flying the appropriate flags on their historical dates at the Veterans Memorial Monument flagpole on the courthouse lawn. The newspaper and television stations have given news coverage of the flags flying. The TGCHC designed a poster / brochure featuring the Flags of the Revolution with details about the historical events or battles related to each flag. This poster / brochure is distributed to schools, visitor centers, and the libraries. The historic flags flying has created a great deal of community interest resulting in numerous requests for speaker programs for several organizations. A banner (6' wide and 2' deep) is at the Veterans Memorial. The banner reads: "October 2, 1835 - April 21, 1836 / 175th Anniversary of the Texas Revolution / Remember The Alamo! Remember Goliad! / Remember Texas Heroes and Veterans! / Sponsor: Tom Green County Historical Commission". This banner will remain on the courthouse lawn until April 22, 2011 (the date Santa Anna was captured). Two duplicate banners were used to decorate our Veterans Day Parade float. All 14 flags of the Revolution flew on the trailer. This float was a major success of the parade and has drawn numerous comments. During Christmas at Fort Concho, the Alabama Red Rover reenactor group used many of our flags during the encampment. The Alabama Red Rovers fought at The Alamo and at Goliad. These flags will fly at three more events during the 175th Anniversary Year 2011.

Thank you for taking time to share the 2010 body of work provided by your CHC. We would like to provide an opportunity for you to share information with us that has not been submitted in this report, or to expand on projects or issues for which you have additional information. Please feel free to share challenges or success stories with our staff in the space below.

1. We respectfully request the THC consider conducting day long Regional Workshops focusing on CHC management skills and archive development. Many CHCs do not have the financial resources to send their members to Annual Conference for a 90-minute session if it were to be on the agenda. Annual conference tends to focus on marketing / partnership skills, and seldom on the steak/potatoes of running a CHC. (Most CHCs we work with have Masters Degrees in Partnerships... we have to. We are especially interested in professional training on records retention, archive development, proper storage, and new technologies used in archiving (not Facebook, YouTube, or Twitter). The current financial condition of the State and the THC makes this training even more imperative. We need to have more skills in operating CHCs considering the 50% staffing cuts threatened. If the THC would consider such a workshop for CHCs within a 150-mile radius, we would gladly host one in San Angelo. We are considering a one - two day workshop with the 2nd day focusing on historical marker repairs, marker application or Historic Texas Cemetery applications. We hope you consider our recommendations.


